Revelations of the Heart

I've been blessed by not only the sun, but the opportunities to pray and open God's Word in the midst of Satan's playground. As I see planes land, I pray for the married men entering Vegas for conventions not to stray from their marital vows. As I see scantily-clad spring break girls, I pray that their purity will be protected as they naively flaunt their sexuality along the strip. As I see locals perched at slot machines, I pray it's not their grocery money disappearing into the machine. It can look daunting and seem scary, but we have to expose the wrongs of our hearts and get them right. Please share the darkness of your heart with Jesus. Ask Him to come into your heart and shine His light on the dark places. He alone knows the intimate details and can change you.

Only through Christ can we have new hearts.
